



## FUN FACTS ABOUT LOCKS AND KEYS

They protect our valuables, secure our homes and fortify our businesses, but how much do you REALLY know about keys?

The OLDEST known lock dates back 4000 years and was discovered in the palatial ruins of Khorsabad in Ninevah, the ancient capital of Assyria. It was a wooden device of tumblers—small, movable wooden pegs that fell by their own weight into the bolt,

SKELETON KEYS are a master key, capable of working many locks. They are called skeleton keys because they are stripped down to their essential parts – or a skeleton.

THE CEREMONY OF KEYS is the oldest ritual of its kind, and still occurs nightly at the Tower of London. Every evening at exactly 9:52pm the sentry cries out "Halt, who comes there?" The Yeoman Warder replies "The keys." "Whose keys?" "Queen Elizabeth's keys." "Pass then, all's well". Aside from the monarch's name, this exact exchange has been spoken for centuries and forms part of the traditional "locking up of the Tower of London. Tickets to watch this ritual must be booked in advance and become fully booked very quickly.

HOUDINI started his career as a locksmith. He went to work at a locksmith's shop at the age of 11, and the young apprentice quickly learned to pick any lock available at the time.

LOUIS XVI was fascinated with locks and keys. He had them made for the pure enjoyment of it, and sometimes fashioned locks to use on furniture like small chests.

KEYS have a cult following. Since their creation, they have been outfitted with designs – from animals, to jewels and woven metal have been used to decorate a keys handle – and are quite the collector's piece.



FORT KNOX – the most secure building in the United States doesn't have traditional locks and keys – access to the building is done at random schedules, and each staff member must enter a different combination code, and that changes daily. Given that the building secures an estimated \$270 billion in gold and treasures, all security measures are shrouded in secrecy.

THE SMALLEST LOCK AND KEY was made by a Russian – Pavel Kulikov. He makes tiny locks and keys that are barely visible to the naked eye. He is credited with making a padlock so small, that it fits around the eye of a needle. It is reported that it weighs a hundredth of a gram, and functions as a normal lock and key.

VIKING WOMEN had POWER! Once married, Viking women were given the great responsibility of being the key holders for the family. A woman's status when married was highly respected n Viking culture and women often wore their husband's keys on their dress as a sign of their power and privilege.

Before locks and keys were widely available, other methods to secure doors and objects had to be used. Rope knots, typically the sailor's Gordian knot, were used to keep doors closed and tie down valuables. The Gordian knot was particularly useful as the creator could detect if it had been tampered with.
