Chinese New Year celebrations were born out of fear and myth. Legend spoke of the wild beast Nian (which also is the word for "year") that appeared at the end of each year, attacking and killing villagers. Loud noises and bright lights were used to scare the beast away, and the Chinese New Year celebrations were born. Today, the 15-day New Year festivities are celebrated with a week of vacation in metropolitan areas of China. Much like the Western New Year (January 1st), the biggest celebration is on the eve of the holiday. At the turn of the new year, firework displays are put on throughout the city.

Traditions

Aside from New Year's Eve, there are other important days of the 15-day Chinese New Year Festival, including:

JIE CAI CENG: Welcoming the Gods of Wealth and Prosperity

On the fifth day of New Year's, it is believed that the gods of prosperity come down from the heavens. Businesses will often participate in setting off firecrackers as they believe it will bring them prosperity and good fortune for their business.

YUAN XIAO JIE: Festival of Lanterns

The 15th day of the New Year is known as the Festival of Lanterns and marks the end of the Chinese New Year celebrations. All types of lanterns are lit throughout the streets and often poems and riddles are often written for entertainment.

There are also paper lanterns on wheels created in the form of either a rabbit or the animal of the year (Ox for 2021). The rabbit lantern stems from a Chinese myth or fairy-tale about a female goddess named Chang E who jumped onto the moon.

So, she would not travel alone, she brought a rabbit with her to keep her company. It is said that if your heart is pure enough, you can see the goddess Chang E and her rabbit on the moon on this day.

Symbols

Red envelopes

Called "Hong bao" in Mandarin, the red envelopes filled with money are typically only given to children or unmarried adults with no job. If you are single and working and making money, you still must give the younger ones the Hong bao money.

The colour red denotes good luck/fortune and happiness/abundance in the Chinese Culture and is often worn or used for decoration in other celebrations.

Dragon

The dragon is present in many Chinese cultural celebrations as the Chinese people often think of themselves as descendants of the mythical creature. On the fifth day of the New Year when many people must start going back to work, they will also have dancing dragons perform in the front of the office building.

On the 15th day of the New Year (Yuan Xiao Jie), they may also have a lot of dancing dragon performances. The dragon represents prosperity, good luck and good fortune.

Traditional Foods

The Chinese New Year's Eve meal is the most important dinner of the year. Typically, families gather at a designated relative's house for dinner, but these days, many families often celebrate New Year's Eve dinner at a restaurant. Many restaurants require reservations months in advance.

There are also some families that hire a professional chef to come cook at their house. Chefs are often busy running from one home to another cooking dinners for different families on New Year's Eve.

Chinese New Year is a 15-day celebration and each day, many families rotate celebrations between homes of their relatives. The festivities are day-long and sometimes, a family ends up cooking two meals for their relatives, once at lunch and once at dinner.

These dishes used to be all made from scratch, but now people can easily buy them pre-packaged at the supermarkets.

- Eight Treasures Rice, which contains rice, walnuts, different coloured dry fruit, raisins, sweet red bean paste, jujube dates, and almonds.
- "Tang Yuan" black sesame rice ball soup; or a won ton soup
- Chicken, duck, fish and pork dishes
- "Song Gao," literally translates to "loose cake," which is made of rice which has been coarsely ground and then formed into a small, sweet round cake.
- "Jiu Niang Tang" sweet wine-rice soup which contains small rice balls.

Ox personalities go well with Rats, Monkeys & Roosters and not so well with Tigers, Horses, Dragons and Goats.







Fried Rice Recipe


Ingredients

- 1 to 2 green onions (chopped)
- 2 large eggs
- Freshly ground pepper (to taste)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons oil (divided)
- 4 cups rice (cooked and cold)
- 1 to 2 tablespoons light soy sauce (or oyster sauce)

Steps to Make It

- 1. Gather the ingredients.
- 2. Wash and finely slice the green onions. Lightly beat the eggs with the pepper and salt.
- 3. Heat a wok or frying pan over medium-high heat and add 1 tablespoon of the oil. When the oil is hot, add the eggs. Cook, stirring, until they are lightly scrambled but not too dry. Remove the eggs and clean out the pan.
- 4. Add the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil. Add the cooked and cooled leftover rice. Stir-fry for a few minutes, using chopsticks or a wooden spoon to break it apart. Stir in the soy sauce or oyster sauce as desired.
- 5. When the rice is heated through, add the scrambled egg back into the pan. Mix thoroughly. Stir in the green onions. Serve hot.

How to play Sudoku

Sudoku Rule № 1: Use Numbers 1-9

Sudoku is played on a grid of 9 x 9 spaces. Within the rows and columns are 9 "squares" (made up of 3 x 3 spaces). Each row, column and square (9 spaces each) needs to be filled out with the numbers 1-9, without repeating any numbers within the row, column or square. As you can see from the image below of an actual Sudoku grid, each Sudoku grid comes with a few spaces already filled in; the more spaces filled in, the easier the game – the more difficult Sudoku puzzles have very few spaces that are already filled in.

Sudoku Rule № 2: Do not Repeat Any Numbers

As you can see, in the upper left square (circled), this square already has 7 out of the 9 spaces filled in. The only numbers missing from the square are 5 and 6. By seeing which numbers are missing from each square, row, or column, we can use process of elimination and deductive reasoning to decide which numbers need to go in each blank space.

For example, in the upper left square, we know we need to add a 5 and a 6 to be able to complete the square but based on the neighbouring rows and squares we cannot clearly deduce which number to add in which space. This means that we should ignore the upper left square for now and try to fill in spaces in some other areas of the grid instead.

Sudoku Rule № 3: Do not Guess.

Sudoku is a game of logic and reasoning, so try not to have to guess. If you do not know what number to put in a certain space, keep scanning the other areas of the grid until you seen an opportunity to place a number. But do not try to "force" anything – Sudoku rewards patience, insights, and recognition of patterns, not blind luck or guessing.

Sudoku Rule № 4: Use Process of Elimination

What do we mean by using "process of elimination" to play Sudoku? Here is an example. In this Sudoku grid (shown below), the far left-hand vertical column (circled in Blue) is missing only a few numbers: 1, 5 and 6.

One way to figure out which numbers can go in each space is to use "process of elimination" by checking to see which other numbers are already included within each square – since there can be no duplication of numbers 1-9 within each square (or row or column).

In this case, we can quickly notice that there are already number 1s in the top left and centre left squares of the grid (with number 1s circled in red). This means that there is only one space remaining in the far-left column where a 1 could possibly go – circled in green. This is how the process of elimination works in Sudoku – you find out which spaces are available, which numbers are missing – and then deduce, based on the position of those numbers within the grid, which numbers fit into each space.

Sudoku rules are relatively uncomplicated – but the game is infinitely varied, with millions of possible number combinations and a wide range of levels of difficulty. But it is all based on the simple principles of using numbers 1-9, filling in the blank spaces based on deductive reasoning, and never repeating any numbers within each square, row or column.






Chinese New Year Wordsearch
